
Message to Sandie

Why is it important to keep Fire Doors shut?

Following a number of recent inspections, it has been noted that some residents have been leaving their flat front door open and we have politely asked residents to refrain from doing this.

This is because fire doors are specially designed to prevent the spread of fire and smoke through a building so people can evacuate safely and the building is protected from damage. A wedge prevents a door from closing, which means fire can spread, putting all occupants in danger.

Kitchen fire doors have also been installed for residents within their properties and it is important that these are not removed to ensure that any potential spread of fire is contained. Whilst we understand the reasoning behind the removal, we ask residents to contact us to make arrangements for reinstatement.
